

attracted to the guts-and-glory narrative spun by Isis. But their discontent is based on economic rather than religious or political marginalisation. Indonesia is a vibrant democracy and its citizens are proud of their diversity and tolerance. Attacks by a handful of fanatics do not signal a country tipping into fundamentalism in Jakarta any more than they do in Paris.
